FROM THE RABBI'S STUDY

Under the auspices of the Adult Education committee, we began this year with a commemoration of the 70th anniversary of *Kristallnacht* on Sunday, November 9th. Now I am pleased to announce the start of the Temple *Sholom* Readers group. We will meet on Sunday Dec. 14 at 10am for "Bagels and Books", nourishment for body and mind.

For our first book, I have chosen *The Temple Bombing*, by Melissa Fay Greene. This is the story of the bombing of The Temple in Atlanta, Georgia in 1958 (the Temple of *Driving Miss Daisy*). The book was published in 1996 and recalls the "time . . . when Jews and African-Americans worked together, . . . for equality and freedom . . .to unite against the fanatics who traffic in hate..."(as quoted from *Elle Magazine* in *The Temple Bombing* Fawcett

Columbine NY 1996, first page). In light of our historic presidential election, I think this is an excellent text for exploring Southern Jewish history, affording us introspection into the Civil Rights Movement, and, I believe, very timely when so many Jewish voters are among President-elect Barack Obama's supporters. I am hoping many of you will read the book in preparation or refresh your memory of it, if you have read it, so we can have a lively discussion. It is still in print and available for purchase "on-line". Or, ask your favorite bookstore, to obtain a copy. Reserve the date, Dec. 14th, for "Bagels and books" (\$5 charge).

As you read this, we are preparing to gather on Saturday night, Dec. 27th for *Chanukah* at the Temple with a gala dinner including entertainment. Bring your *chanukiah* (*menorah*) with you and we will all light together. I hope you light the eight nights at home as well. Many families stop "lighting" when the kids are gone from the house but it is important that we continue to observe the holiday and especially to put the *chanukiah* in the window for all to see. Remember that *Chanukah* celebrates the first struggle for religious freedom. The *Maccabees* fought to recapture the Jerusalem Temple in ancient times after it was overrun and desecrated by the tyrant, Antiochus. When we display the light in our windows, we honor all of those who make it possible for us to enjoy freedom of worship.

Chag urim sahmayach, happy *Chanukah*! And Marty and I send our best wishes for a wonderful 2009!

FROM THE PRESIDENT

Dear Friends,

About 5 weeks ago on Sunday, October 19, I emailed one of my doctors - an orthopedic specialist - and told him that I would be waiting in his office that Monday Morning. I had a pain in my knee that was growing increasingly worse, and something was going to have to be done. When I got there, he examined me; my knee was

scanned at a radiology practice across the street, and it was discovered that there was a meniscus tear (cartilage); a stress fracture of the knee-cap (not caused by worry - sorry, I couldn't resist); and I was going to need surgery. That afternoon I called Ruth and told her that I would not be able to make our Simchat Torah services that evening.

In the blink of an eye, my life over the short term had changed.

I had to beg my doctors to find a way to get me to Detroit prior to surgery the following Friday for an important meeting for our firm; I scheduled the surgery so that I would be able to travel to California for another important meeting; and I needed to be able to be in better condition on the 1st and 3rd of December to get to Chicago and then to Oklahoma City for another two meetings that had unlimited potential for the future growth of our business. For a businessman can not pass up opportunities like these too often and expect to thrive.

I began to get annoyed that I had to put so much energy into persistence and perseverance that I was not sure whether I would have the energy for anything else... and shamefully, there were times I didn't. If I would have thought more about how this past period was affecting those around me; at least in an equal dose to how this was affecting only me; I and everyone around me would have gotten through this a lot better.

Over the past decade and possibly more, we have learned to persist and persevere through our financial issues to a point where we may have lost our focus on what is important in our congregational lives. The business of our Temple always seemed to take precedent over what we as Jews are inspired and commanded to do in Torah because we thought it had to; and that's why the overwhelming majority of you wanted us to finally to find a way to focus on what is important; and not be consumed where our next dollar is coming from.

That's why the past 3 - 4 months have been so frustrating.

Ninety days ago you heard that the Judge "lost" our petition to acquire our new home by mortgaging our property which would also provide operating capital to get us through this transition. Once our attorney, Byron Dresner, discovered that the petition was lost, like any good attorney he called chambers to find out whether or not the lost petition was indeed found. The Judge didn't appreciate Byron's follow-up and essential "punished" us by denying the petition based on the language in the paragraph in just one of hundreds of documents and he wrote on the page "Do Not Call Chambers regarding this Filing... re-submit."

Judges are required to act on these requests within 60 days and Byron re-submitted; did not call the Judge's Chamber's as directed; and the 60 day deadline passed on Sunday the 16th of November. On Monday, Byron called the Judge's

Chambers on the 17th, which was our right; and the Judge's Clerk said, "We were wondering why you didn't re-submit... we were waiting for the re-submission of the paperwork..." to which Byron cited the day and date stamp placed on our re-submission as proof that the Judge received the re-submission. The next day, the Judge's Clerk called Byron and reported that they had "found" the paperwork and would review it. That was November 18th and the date that I am writing this is the 25th and still no word from the Judge's Law Clerk.

Sometimes, when there is nothing else that you can do to affect a positive outcome, persistence and perseverance is a good thing. Isn't that two characteristics of being a Jew? So many of you are probably wondering, how have we been surviving during this time, especially when the financial markets have collapsed to a point where Trillions of Dollars seemed to have disappeared literally in the blink of an eye? One major reason: our 8 Days of Chanukah have lasted for 12 months due in no small part to God's help and an aggressive program of renting out our Social Hall.

We have waited long enough.

If we do not get some response - either positive or negative from this Judge shortly - we will initiate all appropriate legal action to protect our rights - including requesting sanctions from the Board of Judicial Review - after we have petitioned the Chief Justice to remind this judge that even judges must adhere to the law.

Maybe it is time to begin focusing on what is important to us as Jews as soon as we have assured our financial stability. In order to do this, we need to start utilizing our talent to for all the things that our Congregation should be focusing on other than the business of insuring our daily survival.

Is this an unusual thought coming from a businessman? I am hoping that it is not unusual coming from this one. Maybe I've finally learned something.
